Welcome

The Abbey Church of St Peter and St Paul Dorchester-on-Thames Oxfordshire UK

Dorchester-on-Thames is a small, picturesque village set amidst water meadows where the river Thame joins the River Thames, just 8 miles south of Oxford. It has one of the largest churches in Oxfordshire, which stands on the site of a Saxon cathedral built by St Birinus in the seventh century. The Abbey is the parish church of the village and has been the site of worship for over 1300 years



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History

635

The first cathedral church of the West Saxons was built in Dorchester by St Birinus

1140

The Augustinian monks led by Alfred, their first Abbot, took over the Saxon cathedral and began to build the Norman Abbey.

The church was enlarged and a new shrine was made for St Birinus. It became an official place of pilgrimage

1530's

Henry VIII ordered the monastery and the shrine to be Destroyed

1554

The Abbey was bought by Richard Beawforest and given to the people of Dorchester as their Parish Church

Restoration of the Abbey was begun and still continues. You may find work going on in the Abbey today. Look at the notice board to see what is happening





Choose a kneeler you like


Does it have a pattern?

The font is made of lead. It is nearly 800 years old. The pictures show the Apostles. People stand round the font when somebody is baptised and welcome them to church.


