# Meetings of the Trustees of the Friends of Dorchester Abbey

## The Trustees met on Thursday May 23, 2019

The Following issues were discussed:

• The Treasurer's report indicates healthy finances, thus enabling the Friends to continue to support significant projects

• The West End Gallery project. Nick Foreman reported on behalf of the PCC on progress with fundraising for the design proposal and Planning

Permission and for the substantive project. The Trustees confirmed that the West End Gallery is a priority for the Friends, and that they have agreed to allocate £100,000 towards the build costs of the West Gallery project, if and when it goes ahead.

• The Trustees congratulated Steph Forman and the team on the success of this year's Dorchester Festival which raised £45,000 to be shared between the Abbey and the charity <u>-Style acre.</u>

• Honor Juniper presented her regular membership report which indicates that membership both of the Friends and the Beauforest Society is stable.

• Nick Forman reported positive comments and reactions to the additional lighting over the choir and altar steps which has been funded by the Friends.

## The Friends 2019 AGM, June 3, 6.30 p.m.

This year's AGM took place on Monday, June 3, 6.30 p.m. in the Abbey, and was followed, as usual, by supper in the Abbey.

• The Chairman, Richard Dick, highlighted some of the activities and contributions made by the Trustees on behalf of the Friends in the past year

• The Rector expressed appreciation for the Friends' support for improvements in the Abbey, including the contactless giving point. She also gave an update on the situation of the Brasses, in particular the Beauforest Brass, a number of which require repair and conservation.

• Nick Forman reported on behalf of the PCC on the progress with proposals for the West End of the Abbey.

• Honor Juniper as Membership Secretary, reported on current Friends membership at 202 and Beauforest membership at 79. In reporting on deaths of Friends over the past year, she gave particular thanks to Bessie Kelaart, former Chairman of the Friends, Christopher Gibbs, Vice President of the Friends for a number of years, Roger Mitchell and Frank Norman.

• The Trustees are indebted to Linda Wastie who provides excellent back-up both to Honor Juniper (membership) and to Ingrid Lunt (Newsletter), and of course to the Chairman.

• The Treasurer reported on a healthy financial situation which enables the Friends to continue to support the Abbey.

## Friends of Dorchester Abbey Outing to Worcester Cathedral, Monday May 13, 2019

Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May dawned bright and sunny as a group of Friends and a few guests boarded a coach to Worcester. The journey took us through the Cotswold countryside, which was looking its best. Fresh green foliage and blossom in the hedgerows, and stunning views across the Vale of Evesham.

Arrival in Worcester about 11 o'clock enabled us to explore the town at our leisure before the Cathedral tour at 3.00. Worcester is a fascinating town, steeped in history. Some of us did a self-guided tour round the town using a very well structured leaflet from the Information centre. Others had a preliminary visit to the cathedral.

At 3pm we all gathered in the cathedral cloister to be met by two cathedral guides who gave us a comprehensive description of the history of the building, and pointed out some features of particular interest. To quote the Dean:

"Worcester Cathedral is a magnificent sight as it rises majestically above the River Severn. Worcester has been the seat of a bishopric since the Seventh Century, and the Cathedral was served by monks until the Reformation. St Oswald and St Wulfstan were among the bishops. Since the Eighteenth Century, the Cathedral has been famous for its part in the annual Three Choirs Festival, the oldest choral festival in existence. "

There are two important tombs in the cathedral<sub>*i*</sub> that of King John who died in 1216 and requested to be buried in the cathedral, and of Prince Arthur Tudor, eldest son of Henry VIII. After the tour we were taken to the Cathedral visitor centre and treated to a delicious tea prepared by the Friends of Worcester Cathedral...and dulyDuly refreshed, we returned to Dorchester.

Our warm thanks go to Yvonne Lawden who, as always had organised the event with a gentle touch, but had ensured that it was perfectly planned so that everyone could relax and enjoy a wonderful day.

# The Very Revd Professor Martyn Percy, Dean of Christ Church

Martyn Percy is one of the leading theological scholars of our time. He was Principal of Ripon College, Cuddesdon, one of the largest Anglican ordination training centres in the world from 2004-14 and is a highly respected author, preacher and speaker. Martyn writes on religion in contemporary culture and modern ecclesiology.



The lecture will explore what faith, religion and spirituality look like for the emerging generation. Specifically, Martyn will look at the claim that young people are 'spiritual but not religious', and are 'believing without belonging', and will look at some of the cultural issues we have in society in relation to faith and belief - and also what happens to ethics/morality when it is not rooted in a religious tradition.
