Talking Point

'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.' Matthew 5:9

November nights draw in fast and the darkness settles in early. We love to come in from the cold, snuggle under a blanket with a cup of coffee and watch our favourite series. There's nothing like crisp winter nights. Soon, however, the atmosphere will change and the skies will be full of fireworks, brief, brilliant flashes of light.

Bonfire Night has its odd mix of celebration and caution. We gather round the flames to remember history, to enjoy a bit of spectacle, and to share hot chocolate with neighbours. For one night, darkness is pushed back, not by floodlights or technology, but by sparks, laughter and a sense of belonging. A single spark is enough to draw people together, and it's a reminder that light and warmth often start small.

I've been thinking about that as I follow the news from Palestine and Israel. I'm not sure where we will be by the time

this comes to print, I hope at peace. The suffering caused by this war is beyond words. Ordinary families are caught in something vast and violent, and the images on our screens can leave us feeling helpless. But 'Blessed are the peacemakers,' said Jesus, not the powerful or the perfect, but those who, in whatever way they can, bring calm where there is anger and hope where there is despair.

Jesus showed what that looks like in practice, bringing light into dark places, crossing boundaries, and loving those everyone else had written off. His way of peace wasn't loud or forceful, but steady and kind, like the glow of embers that refuse to go out.

Most of us can't change global politics, but we can tend the small fires of peace in our own patch: listening before judging, speaking kindly when it's easier to sneer, forgiving when it costs us something. Peace making begins close to home, at the kitchen table, in the village hall, at work, at school, even online.

Bonfire Night itself began with division, gunpowder and plots and the failure of understanding between neighbours. Centuries later, perhaps it can remind us to do better: to be sparks of peace, not sparks that ignite more conflict.

So as we wrap up warm and watch the fireworks this month, perhaps we can pause for a moment. Between the bangs and bursts of colour, look around at the faces beside us, friends, strangers, the whole muddle of humanity gathered for warmth and

May we each, in our own small way, be lights in the darkness and peacemakers where we are planted, following the one who first lit the way.

The Hempcroft Allotment Association held its Annual General Meeting on 2 October at the village hall, with an excellent turnout from members. It was heartening to see so many allotmenteers actively participating in discussions and showing their continued commitment to the success of our community.

The current committee includes Edward Metcalfe (Chairman), Jon Rosby (Treasurer), Charlotte Bennett, Ian Ford Batey, Matthew Grayson, and Roger Seabrook. At the meeting, Jon Rosby announced his decision to step down after ten years as Treasurer. His dedication and behind-the-scenes work have been instrumental in keeping our finances on track and the allotments running smoothly. We extend our heartfelt thanks to Jon for his significant contribution.

All other committee members stood for re-election and were unanimously approved. We're also pleased to welcome two new members to the team: William Yates, who will take over as Treasurer, and Matilda Fisher. Their enthusiasm and fresh perspectives will be a great asset to the Association.

Jon presented the annual accounts, which show a healthy financial position and a modest surplus. All rent payments are passed directly to the Parish Council, while the £10 subscription fee covers insurance and our statutory membership with the National Society of Allotment and Leisure Gardeners. Rents and subscriptions remain unchanged for the coming year and are now due. Members are encouraged to order seeds through the National Society catalogue, which offers discounted prices and provides a small financial benefit to our Association.

A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Best Allotment 2025 award to Matilda Fisher. Having taken on an overgrown plot earlier this year, Matilda has transformed it into a thriving space full of vibrant vegetables and flowersno small feat given the dry weather this summer. Congratulations, Matilda, on a well-deserved win!

The meeting also addressed plot utilisation, noting that a few plots are currently vacant. If you're interested in joining our allotment community, please contact a committee member.


A lively discussion followed on several issues. Concerns were raised about plots left untended despite rent being paid, resulting in weed spread to neighbouring plots. It was agreed that such tenants should be contacted and reminded of their responsibilities under the tenancy agreement. Other topics included site parking, hosepipe usage, removal of waste and the overgrown hedge on the footpath between Rotten Row and Samian Way. The committee welcomes further input and will be working on these matters in the coming months.

Looking ahead, the focus shifts to clearing spent crops and weeds. It's the perfect time to dig in organic matter-manure, compost, or leaf mould-to enrich the soil for next year's growing season.

If you've ever talked about penicillin, you've likely heard of Alexander Fleming. In 1928, Fleming famously discovered penicillin when he

noticed that mould growing on an unattended petri dish killed the surrounding staphylococcus bacteria. However, achieving penicillin's clinical use was far from immediate—it took a dedicated team of Oxford scientists over a decade to get there, as explained by historian and museum curator Marie-Louise Kerr at our monthly meeting. Fleming himself wasn't able to isolate and stabilise the substance, but he wrote about its potential benefits.

Fast forward to 1938, Howard Florey and Ernst Chain began searching for a chemical that could kill harmful microbes without harming patients. Discovering Fleming's paper, they worked with Norman Heatley to stabilise penicillin and initiated testing. In their experiments, eight mice were infected—four were treated and survived, while the untreated ones died. The first human patient to receive penicillin was in 1941 and saw significant improvement, commemorated today with a blue plaque at the JR hospital. The challenge then became mass-producing penicillin during wartime. Florey and Heatley decided to fly to the USA, where a woman named Margaret Hutchinson created an innovative system for largescale production. Penicillin became available in Britain in 1946. For their work, Fleming, Florey, and Chain received the Nobel Prize in Medicine in 1945. Dorothy Crowfoot Hodgkin, who determined penicillin's atomic structure and advanced its therapeutic use, was awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1964—her bust is displayed at the Oxford University Museum of Natural History. Marie-Louise Kerr's talk was both captivating and informative.

Future Programme: In November Lucy Gasson will talk of 'Saints, Stunners, Marmalade and Medicine'. Our December meeting will feature Pandemonium, a Ceilidh Band, a lively start to the Christmas celebrations, there will be wine and canapes too! In January Peter Tickler's talk is entitled 'Jam and Murder' and we are planning a New Year Meal at a local restaurant in addition. February will see Sarah Turton talking about 'Food as Medicine' which brings us to the end of the WI year and our Annual Meeting in March 2026.

It is always a lovely friendly atmosphere at our monthly meetings. Seeing old friends, making new ones, coffee, cake and a chat, followed by an interesting talk or activity. We would love to welcome you, come and join us, we have members from Dorchester, Shillingford and Warborough. The first meeting is free!





Light up Dorchester for Christmas!



Local bands and musicians (The Dreaming Spires, Only the Brave and stringman) were joined by The Annie Keating Band, all the way from Brooklyn, for a sell out fundraising gig at The Snug Barn on 26 September. The concert was the idea of The Fleur's Sunday Session regulars as a way of raising some money for the sports pavilion building project, which is aiming to rebuild the clubhouse to provide much-needed facilities for the local cricket, football and tennis clubs.

The gig was also a great opportunity to showcase the incredible live music venue we have in Dorchester and open the autumn season of musical events at The Snug. The generous support

of Bishops Court Farm and all the bands meant that all the ticket proceeds were donated, raising £1,972 in total.

Dorchester is home to not only one of the newest and best live music venues in the South-East but also home to many musical talents. Robin Bennett's band The Dreaming Spires have a new album titled *Normal Town* (on Clubhouse Records) and Only the Brave and stringman are both working on new material in the studio.

It was a pleasure opening the show with local piano legend David Gentleman joining me to play the barn's beautiful grand piano. Drawing on my songbook our set included reworked versions of songs from my band days like 'Edge of the River' before we rounded things off with a foot stomping boogie-woogie version of 'Friday Night' mashed up with Petula Clark's big hit 'Downtown'. For the final band of the night, Robin and Joe Bennett were joined by their band for a set packed full of The Dreaming Spires greatest hits and a few other classics too. Whilst their sweet harmonies and the chiming Rickenbacker guitar owe a lot to the 60s, their set included songs from 'Normal Town' that feel destined to become modern classics. Songs such as 'Normalisation' and '21st Century Light Industrial Park' offer a unique songwriter's perspective on Milton Park and Didcot no less! The band gave us glimpses of their musical influences playing a fantastic version of Bangles-influenced 'September Girl' and then finally 'A Hard Day's Night'. With everyone now firmly on their feet wanting to dance the night away, the band called the singers back on the stage for a final singalong of 'The Weight' by The Band. After a few extra choruses thrown in, everyone had sung their hearts out and time was called on a fantastic night out.

Dorchester News November 2025

I had toyed with the idea of going from John O'Groats to Lands End as an 80th birthday challenge for several months, but there was no going back when son William announced at my birthday celebration I was doing it in a month's time. Partner Tina generously agreed to act as vehicle back up, and I signed up the Prisoners Education Trust designated charity. We would take three weeks and pre-book accommodation, which required at least roughly identifying a route of minor roads and paths. Son Albert declared he would borrow a bike and join me for the last week to make sure I survived the notorious Devon and Cornwall switch back hills.

A week before departure my fund raising went live, and donations poured in in astonishing quantity. It was clear from accompanying comments that most thought

I was wildly but amusingly over ambitious, and two days into the ride I heartily agreed with them, without the amusement.

At John O'Groats the car door was almost wrenched off its hinges by the wind on opening it. But at least it wasn't raining, and after battling the wind for half a mile the road turned right and I was enjoying a very strong tail wind. Too strong in fact, as side gusts alarmingly unbalanced me. My first lesson: keeping one's balance when hit by a cross wind requires faster reactions than this 80 year old can always deliver. However, the journey to Thurso was safely accomplished - a good start.

The next day the wind had reversed into a less strong head wind, but although overcast it was not raining and the sun soon came out. Several steepish hills against the wind took a lot of effort. Despite a good lunch stop in Bettyhill and a lovely narrow lane afterwards the afternoon became a frustrating exercise of sheer willpower. I just made the agreed meeting point but had hoped to do more. It was clear that I was not going to be able to keep to our schedule of overnight stops without doing some of the journey by car.

That decision took the pressure off, although I was very conscious of the weight of donations predicated on completion on a bike. The next day we went by car up the first hill, and thereafter we judged how I felt each day. I took an

unscheduled day off twice, the first when the schedule was to go through Glasgow but the weather forecast was continuous rain, and the second when we arrived at the start point just as heavy rain started, again scheduled to last all day (as it did).

The route took us down through the centre of Scotland - Thurso, Lairg, Inverness, Aviemore, Glasgow, Moffat, Gretna Green, and then Carlisle, Penrith, Wigan, Kirkby Lonsdale, Shrewsbury, Monmouth, Chepstow, Severn Bridge, Avonmouth, Somerset Levels, Taunton, Crediton, Liskeard, St Austell, Penzance, Lands End. Navigation was done on my mobile, using the Ordnance Survey maps on its app, with

the route highlighted. The only issue was whether the phone had enough charge to last the day - it always did.

Some more memorable snippets from my diary convey how it felt along the way:

'Guesthouse very tired and mediocre; very conscious how much weaker than I was four years ago [when I also did the journey]; great views but very tired; not enjoying cycling head down and weak; started in fierce wind; too hard going to enjoy and walked some hills; new pedal noisy and gears cranky; b&b disaster; torrential rain, roads awash and very steep downhill - difficult to control braking; dried out a bit in a pub; saved by Greek restauranteur; friendly local shop; good cycling day and felt much better; burnt kipper for breakfast; sunshine and beautiful fell views but very tough

hills in strong headwind; farmers cutting hedges everywhere risk of punctures; raining steadily in afternoon; straight onto rough stone canal path, then couldn't find the route; traffic everywhere, but considerate and patient; Alb (son Albert) new to his borrowed bike - had to adjust saddle and its thin tyres cracked and perished; wonderful day with Alb in good form; Alb as tired as me after a long hard day, but glorious Somerset Levels with sunshine and following breeze; worried about falling in canal under narrow low bridges; very hilly but nice lunch in sunny Crediton market square; lovely bike ride down Granite Way then very steep and tiring switchback hills; overnight pub in unattractive suburbia; great view of St. Michael's Mount; delayed our arrival to ensure Tina ready for Land's End photos, but arrived as she was trying to destroy the parking payment machine in effort to pay for parking; man at bar with two ferrets in a bag; wonderful relaxed Prosecco consuming evening - great end to a testing journey.

'To sum up, I cycled 715 miles out of a projected 995. Average speeds varied considerably from day to day, from 11.2 mph to 6.7. It was much harder than my previous long distance rides despite doing much more training this time; age tells.

This is the FOURTH time that Richard has cycled from John O'Groats to Lands End

The weather is very important psychologically - particularly head winds. We had no mechanical problems, and no punctures.

'Most important, I raised £5,000 for Prisoners Education Trust, for which I am most grateful. I never knew I had so many friends.

After a quiet summer, there have been some fairly major developments affecting South Oxfordshire's local plan and senior management...

After lengthy deliberations, the planning inspectors have written to South and Vale councils asking them to withdraw the Joint Local Plan, in particular on the issue of "duty to cooperate" – specifically with Oxford City Council.

This is undoubtedly a blow for both councils and for our communities. It's no secret that there's disagreement within Oxfordshire on how many homes the rural districts should provide on Oxford's behalf, but clearly officers felt they had managed to fulfil the duty (which is not a duty to agree). The inspectors clearly though otherwise!

Over the past four years, officers and councillors at South and Vale have worked incredibly hard together to create an innovative and positive plan for housing and development in our areas that seeks to raise standards, actively address the need for genuinely affordable social housing, and tackle the climate and nature emergency.

There has been widespread and extensive consultation and engagement with the thousands who have constructively engaged in the process, including members of the public, community representatives, partner organisations, neighbouring councils, and businesses in the area.

I certainly share the council's disappointment that the Planning Inspectors have recommended that the councils withdraw the plan from the examination process over a single issue - the "duty to co-operate". Oxford City Council itself was forced to withdraw its own local plan from examination earlier this year over the same issue.

What does this mean for our villages? Well, while it's still unclear what happens next for the Joint Local Plan, the existing local plan and policies remain in place, and community Neighbourhood Plans remain important for planning decisions.

Berinsfield Garden Village update

As above, the existing allocations for large "strategic sites" have not changed, including at Mount Farm in Berinsfield, but the local plan news will affect the timing of the Berinsfield "regeneration strategy", which had been due to coincide with it. It's important this is dealt with sooner rather than later as it will help us raise funds to improve local community facilities.

You may also have seen leaflets from Homes England about the controversial Chalgrove Airfield site – which is in the current local plan, but would have been removed by the Joint Local Plan!

Council Chief stands down

Mark Stone, council chief executive since July 2017, has decided to leave South and Vale councils on 30 September 2025. During his tenure, the councils have stabilised finances, invested in key political priorities like homelessness prevention, delivered new housing stock for the first time in over 25 years, and advanced climate adaptation and nature recovery initiatives. Two deputy chief executives are managing operations until an internal successor is appointed, with an eye towards the council's expected dissolution in 2028

Food and Warmth Grant Scheme launched to support residents this winter

South Oxfordshire District Council have launched a Food and Warmth Grant Scheme to help local organisations who are directly supporting residents struggling with the rising cost of living.

The scheme will distribute grants to local not-for-profit organisations delivering projects that improve access to food and help people keep their homes warm. It is funded through the Government's Household Support Fund which is allocated via Oxfordshire County Council.

Grants are available, with the scheme closing for applications midday 6 November 2025. Local groups can apply for up to £2,000 if un-constituted, £2,000–£5,000 if constituted, and up to £10,000 for collaborations between three or more not-for-profit organisations led by a constituted group.

The funding can support a wide range of initiatives, including:

- Supplying food and essential household items such as toiletries (including period products) and cleaning products
- Providing warm equipment like blankets, hot water bottles and energy-efficient cooking equipment
- Covering costs linked to running Warm Welcome Spaces
- Purchasing equipment to support food and warmth projects such as cooking or gardening clubs
- Short-term staffing, venue or fuel costs to deliver projects
- Educational activities that promote healthy eating, energy saving, budgeting and household resilience

Eligible applicants include constituted and un-constituted notfor-profit groups, voluntary and community organisations, Community Interest Companies (CICs), preschools and PTAs (for non-statutory items), parish and town councils, food banks, community fridges and redistribution groups.

For the next Full Council on 4 November we are currently considering a question concerning the proposed Abingdon Reservoir. It would appear that in an emergency the reservoir would need to lose 1 metre of water across the entire footprint in one day – they (Thames Water) are proposing that this would be piped south of Abingdon at a frankly alarming rate (3x the normal river flow), and no work has been done on modelling what this would mean for all of our communities (and beyond). I am working with various organisations on understanding what this would potentially mean to us.

Councillor Grants: These are now available! However, a word of warning, I have the grandiose sum of £10k to award over two years. I am therefore planning on being very selective and will only make any awards to those who speak to me about their requirement first. The minimum grant is £500, whilst the maximum is £4k. The grants cannot be awarded to individuals, or to companies, and must come with an argument as to why it is needed, what the money will go towards, and over what time period. From my perspective it also needs to have a social value. To apply you will need to fill in an online form – email me for the link - but please bear in mind my stipulations above! Do also bear in mind that when it's gone, it's gone.

My roles: Are as per last month. I did have my first board meeting for the Chiltern National Landscape and our first Military Champions meeting. If anyone is interested in these, please reach out to me.

News in brief:

A4074 policing: In August Thames Valley Police have continued to monitor the A4074.and the road had been resurfaced and remarked around Dorchester. The new road markings clearly provide less room for overtaking; this will be monitored over time.

Local Government reorganisation: There is a lot of talk over the proposed new Unitary Councils. In Oxfordshire we have three options. I am now on the location working group looking at how the new organisations could be organised. This is a difficult task as we don't know which way the government are going to turn. All we can try to do is set out the right stall and hopefully guide the government on how best to consider the restructuring. If you want my views on this, please ask!

Local Questions to next Full Council (4 Nov):

My proposed questions for next Full Council (November) are:

FixMyStreet / **Councillor Enquiry platforms**: Both of these platforms are there to raise local issues that need to be resolved. I know a lot of people have raised FixMyStreet issues only for them to be closed or stated as complete – when nothing has happened! Why is this happening, and what does this mean for the stats used by OCC on issue resolution?

Complexity of papers: During my initial meetings at OCC, I have been astounded by the volume of materials you are required to read and their complexity. The Place Scrutiny meeting for the Congestion Charge required 1,008 pages of materials to be read. It's become obvious to me that a lot of time is wasted in committee meetings with councillors asking questions, when the answers lie in the documentation. How do we go about changing this structure to be more efficient? Can we ask councillors on all committees to submit questions before the meetings (in the same way that Full Council does with Cabinet questions)?
